Hello.

The Format Festival emerged because, sometime around 2006, my friend Joel Catchlove and I felt that Adelaide is a lot like Pablo Picasso stacking shelves at Coles: a cantankerous genius resigned to mediocrity. We believed there must be other people in Adelaide who shared a desire to see the city shake off its reputation for dullness and began trying to find them before they all moved to London, Berlin, New York or, god forbid, Melbourne. So we teamed up with Ready Set Ride, the ST5K festival and a host of activists, artists and independent publishers and the result is the Format Festival.

An Introductory the Director.

In more technical terms, the Format Festival is an attempt to set up an artist and activist run event, themed around notions of Do-It-Yourself or Participatory Culture. It's directed on an entirely non-profit, non-professional basis by a rough collective of community organising superstars. All the events are free, unless the artists involved absolutely have to cover costs, in which case there might be a small donation involved. While the festival itself is run independently, we've received support from the South Australian Youth Arts Board, Adelaide City Council, the absolutely lovely people at the Graham F Smith Peace Trust and the Adelaide Fringe.

Last year, we ran the festival over three days during 45 degree weather. This year we're running it over two weeks. We'd like to see it grow and take place again next year. If you'd like to take part in running it, writing grants for it or generally helping out next year, please get in touch.

145 Hindley Street Open from Twoish or Threeish to Lateish (Opposite the Rosemont, next to the Crazy Horse)

Nearly everything held as part of the Format Festival is taking place at 145 Hindley Street, which has been lent to us at an outrageously low price by our friends at the Fringe.

Inside, there are the following distinctive areas:


(1) The Jimmy Casper Commemorative Gallery Open Three till Late depending on who volunteers to man it.

Named after professional cyclist Jimmy Casper, two time winner of the Tour de France's Lantern Rouge (awarded to the last placed rider) and renowned for crashing, landing on his face and tearing his tongue, the Jimmy Casper Commemorative Gallery would have been a bar. But then our landlord build a wall in front of the toilets. So we lost our liquor license.

(2) The Chester Carlson Memorial Resource Room Featuring Free Photocopying

Open hopefully all festival from 3ish to 6 or 7ish.

Chester Carlson is the oft forgotten inventor of the photocopier and we're proud to name our zine resource room after him. The resource room boasts free photocopying (although you might need to bring your own paper) for zinesters from March 1st to March 14th. Supplies and opening hours depend partly on donation and willing volunteers. On the 14th, the resource room will also host an 'interactive' display from legendary Australian zine king Luke You. (3) The Rino Del Zoppo Gallery

Rich in character, this gallery is not unlike Rino himself. Also, both of them feature groundbreaking work by artists who are equally renowned for their guerilla dance routines. That's where the similarities end. Rino was our contact at Fringe who nursed us through our first few attempts at running zine fairs and festivals and we've named this gallery in his honour.

(4) The John W Howard Memorial Hall

Our glorious main gallery and performance space, which eerily resembles a prison. At the time of writing, it appears we can't open the back door because the lock is broken and we can't find a way to get an air conditioner in there. Thus, it's the perfect environment in which to remember the Howard era, whilst allowing yourself to be distracted by fine art, film, performance and music.

(5) The Jillian McKeague Courtyard

Named after our contact at the Fringe this year, who was personally responsible for finding us a venue we could use for two weeks and answered all of our questions, even when they were stupid, derogatory or openly offensive. This section of the venue allows you a view of the clear blue sky above, in the same way Jillian's professionalism was a spot of clear sky in the fog of our confusion.




Humble Bee

A rebus is a pictorial representation of written text. A rebus can be a complex picture puzzle or as simple as an icon. Three artists, Ashoka Chowta, Tom Roberts and John Willanski, invite you to this world of graphical picture where meaning is linked to image.

Ashoka's artwork tends to be abstract, highly stylised, unusual, free, certainly not refined, often light hearted and occasionally dark. He studied Graphic Design at TAFE SA 2006. "The approach taken when doing these rebuses was firstly to pick words I liked the sound of and secondly, words that could easily become rebuses." 


